The Itinerary


Please be clear that this tour itinerary is one of the most dedicated photographic journeys you will ever undertake. We spend a lot of time along this route returning to the beaches of Jökulsárlón and views of the Vestrahorn. This part of the trip will be very very slow and allow an excess of time to explore deeply the art of landscape photography and the skills required to chase auroras in the night sky.

Day 1 / Reykjavik

We start our tour in the capital of Reykjavik with a final chance to shop for cold weather gear and prepare for the aurora chases ahead. In the weeks ahead we will do our best to be active at night when the Northern Lights are on show. You will need a very good tripod to make the most of these sessions, plus some suitable warm clothing. We will help you in advance of the trip to ensure you have the right gear for the climate.

Day 2-3 / Geysir and Gulfoss

We spend two nights in the town of Geysir, with lots of time to enjoy Thingvellir National Park along the way. This network of islands and lakes forms a massive wetlands environment that is partially frozen when we visit. This drive also provides more opportunities to stop and meet herds of Icelandic Horses, a pure breed of horse uniquely adapted to the Icelandic conditions and rather photogenic. The highlight of this visit will be the massive landscapes of Gullfoss, a series of plunging waterfalls that photograph best when covered in snow.



Day 4 / Vik

On our way east we spend some time enjoying the black sands of Vik. This is a unique piece of Icelandic coastline and offers a great opportunity to learn about slow-shutter photography.

Day 5-7 / Jökulsárlón

This is the first of our slow sections for this tour. We will spend three nights close to the beaches of Jökulsárlón, with ease of access to return according to the changing light and weather. Our main subject will be the massive glaciers that get washed onto the black sands of the beach. We also will make plans to chase some ice caves while in the area. We have flexibility during this part of the tour to add a walk into Skaftafell or Svínafellsjökull if we enjoy early success with the glaciers.

Day 8-10 / Vestrahorn

We travel a short way along the coast to another amazing part of Iceland, the coastline at Stokksnes and the beautiful lines of the Vestrahorn. The geology of this peninsula offers many inspiring angles, and we want to have lots of time to explore the changing light and foregrounds. We will be here for three nights.

Day 11-13 / Eastern Route

This section of the trip takes us into the farthest route of Iceland, looping around from the southern coast to the north, via the eastern highway. We have a number of charming town we want to visit and a plan to be ready for more aurora action.

Day 14-16 / Myvatn

One of our favourite parts of Iceland are the lakes and waterfalls found in the far north of Iceland. We have put aside three nights to explore this area. Our two main locations will be the remarkably beautiful waterfalls of Goðafoss and Dettifoss. The wider region of Myvatn has many treasures as well, plus some great inspiration when chasing auroras at night. Having plenty of time to enjoy this section of Iceland will be a rewarding experience, and will allow you to reflect on a special journey designed for the delight of photographers.

Day 17 / Departure

Today is the day we head home. We'll drive to the small airport at Akureyri and drop you off for the flight back to Reykjavik. If you want to stay in Iceland a little longer you can head into the city, or simply connect with your international flight homeward.

Do bring your laptop and your preferred processing software. A photo is never finished at the moment of the shutter, and as you learn different ways to process your images you can also adjust your technical approach to the camera accordingly.




Cameras are cool

We hear a lot of fuss about taking cameras into Arctic conditions and how to prepare for the freezing temperatures. If you're shooting with a modern DSLR camera then you need no special equipment, modifications or protection. Keeping cameras tidy in the snow is very easy. Rain is more inconvenient and we want seriously colder temperatures in order to avoid getting wet. Snow is our friend.

On a recent journey in a colder region of the Arctic we spent hours with our gear shooting the Northern Lights in -32 temperatures. No problems. Your camera will go colder than that and still keep shooting. Your batteries wont last quite as long as when warm, but it's no drama. Really.

Heading outside at night to shoot the aurora does require that you take care of yourself, and ensure you keep your feet and fingers warm. A tripod is essential and a timer remote is very handy.



Northern Lights

This tour is an ideal opportunity to chase the Aurora Borealis, the Northern Lights. The tour is designed to take full advantage of clear skies at night, with immediate transport available to head out to special locations if conditions look promising.

There are no guarantees with Aurora activity however. You need high solar activity as well as clear skies to get a light show, although even a low grade intensity Aurora is something spectacular to see and photograph.

We will have dedicated sessions to plan for the Northern Lights and explain how to photograph them. A sturdy tripod is required for best results and a remote shutter cable is recommended.

Learn and Explore

Dress for the Cold

This is not an expedition to the North Pole, you will not freeze to death when visiting Iceland in the winter. There's always a warm cabin and a hot cup of chocolate just around the corner at all times, but the experience of winter in the ice and snow is truly magical. We know what you should pack to stay cosy on this tour...

A big puffy down jacket:

You can quickly go from toasty temperatures inside the cottage to mega minus degrees outside.

Windstopper gloves:

Essential for operating your camera on sub-zero days.

Big boots:

Leave room in the boots for extra air and you'll always have warm feet. Buy a bigger size and then stomp through knee deep snow without a worry.

Dry pants:

We often romp through fresh snow to reach a shot, so a thin layer of dry pants simply keeps the snow and wind off your legs.


Thermals:

A layer of thermals will keep a warm core close to your skin on the coldest of nights when heading out to shoot aurora activity.

Keeping warm simply requires the right gear, and a toasty warm cabin when you need it. "There is no bad weather, only bad clothing."
