EWEN BELL IAN ROLFE GUIDE GUNNAR SHELLIE FROIDEVAUX

Join us for two weeks of winter wonderland in Arctic Norway, immersed in winter snow and the dancing light of auroras. Charming fishing cottages and dramatic coastal scenery will be your reward for this adventure.

A unique and charming exploration across the rugged landscapes of Tromsø, Senja & Lyngen, with the help of local experts and two professional photographers.

Day 1-4 | Kvaløya (Tromsø)

Our home for these three days are some lovely cabins to the west of Tromsø, right on the water. It's a remarkably peaceful part of the coast and ideal for chasing auroras should we get clear conditions at night. Tromsø is a great airport to fly into with lots of connections to Oslo and some international cities as well.

We've picked out some exceptional locations to photograph around the islands of Kvaløya and Ringvassøya, plus we'll traverse into the city of Tromsø and explore some of the fjords to the east of the hills. We want to ensure that everyone on the workshop has a chance to practise their night photography and adjust to shooting in the cold. We walk through the basic techniques for auroras, star trails and discuss how moonlight and twilight will affect your creative options.

Days 5-7 | Senja

We have a 4 hour drive to reach our next location, the remote coastline of Senja. Along the way we pass sweeping hills and quiet coastal communities, before hitting those dramatic plunging fjords that we love so much. The weather here can be equally dramatic, with sudden bursts of snow or breaking sunlight giving us different charms to photograph. We have also picked out some locations for Aurora photography on the nearby coastline. Senja is lesser known than Lofoten and a lot less crowded, but still has the dramatic peaks that plunge down into the fjords. It's very special.

Days 8-10 | Grov

This little fishing village is out of the way but worth the diversion. Not only is there some magnificent scenery to be enjoyed from the water, but also some pristine frozen lakes that we can explore with the help of local experts. The local cooking is excellent here too:) This stop lets us enjoy some mountain auroras as well as on the coastline.

Day 10-13 | Lyngen

Of all the places we have travelled in the Arctic for aurora photography, Lyngen is our favourite. It's a very quiet part of Norway and has not been overrun by photographers yet. It is peaceful and rich in steep mountains and open skies. We have a handful of photogenic locations to choose from here, depending on the weather conditions.

We stay in the same cabins for the duration of our Lyngen visit for maximum comfort, and maximum opportunity to shoot auroras.

Days 14 | Departure

We leave the cabins at 9:00am to head to town and catch our flight from Tromsø. We have a ferry and some icy roads to cover on the way but nothing we haven't done before.

We've heard horror stories from our travellers about other Arctic workshops that do not include any meals, and leave you to either self cater from a local supermarket or pay extra for meals at a very expensive restaurant. If you're spending time sorting basic meals it means you're not spending time enjoying your photography.

With the help of Shellie Froidevaux we not only make sure you get great meals along the way, but expect a few special treats for those cold nights standing out in the cold waiting for an aurora. Shellie loves to go the extra mile.

NORTHERN LIGHTS

Over a decade of experience shooting the Aurora Borealis is behind this tour design.

This is the very best opportunity to see and capture this phenomenon.

Every detail of the tour is designed to take full advantage of clear skies at night, with immediate transport available to head out to special locations if conditions look promising.

Accommodation along this journey has been selected to give us the best chance to act quickly and go out shooting when the aurora is on.

There are no guarantees with Aurora activity however. You need high solar activity as well as clear skies to get a good show, although even a low grade intensity Aurora over the city of Tromsø is something spectacular to see and photograph. That's why we stay close to this part of the coast, where the aurora circle meets beautiful scenery.

We will also have dedicated sessions to plan for the Northern Lights and explain how to photograph them.



NORWAY

AURORA GUIDE

Local outdoors guide and auroa chaser, Guide Gunnar.

Gunnar has been working with us in Norway for over a decade now, but his career in Aurora chasing goes back decades. His knowledge of the weather and terrain in northen Norway is unmatched.

Gunnar does a lot more than drive the bus for us. He helps us plan the itineraries to stay ahead of changes with roads, ferries and avalanche conditions. Every year is different. Local knowledge is essential.

He's pretty handy with a camera, but even more handy with a fishing line and an axe. If the schedule allows we'll ask Gunnar to take us onto the frozen fjords, catch some fish, and cook it on the spot. We can't promise a 2 metre cod, but he'll make sure you stay warm and have some fun.


MOONLIT NIGHTS

We schedule our tours so that we enjoy a variety of night time conditions, from pure darkness to full moonlight. Each has it's own benefits, but if the objective is to capture beautiful compositions then a moonlit night allows for both aurora activity as well as the amazing Norwegian fjords.

The key moonlit auroras are to pick the right place. Locations too far away from the aurora circle get less of the action, but close to Tromsø is the perfect combination of longitude and latitude to give you brilliant events high in the sky even when the solar activity is otherwise modest.

The colours of a moonlit aurora are different also. With the blue sky coming through the brilliant green really shines, without the need of massive manipulation in Photoshop that leads to a very fake looking scene. With the moonlight on your side, you get the real colours, better tonal range and more creative options.

Ian also conducts a handful of his own workshops each year and gives lectures at camera clubs to help members advance their photographic knowledge and skills.

He's a great companion for our Norway adventures. You'll see why after two weeks on tour:)


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CABIN LIFE

This tour is based on cabin accommodation. They tend to be very cosy, very warm and very practical for these journeys. Sometimes they are stand alone cabins stretching across a beach, sometimes they are the top floor of a Bryggen with stunning views across the harbour at night.

Always they are hand chosen by Ewen and Shellie as great places to step outside and photograph. We visit the Arctic every year and visit the latest places to stay, often with tips from our local friends. Cabins mean everyone is offered a single room for this trip, although please do not expect to have a private ensuite.

Sometimes our cabins are very very remote. That is why we have Shellie for the duration of the tour, to keeps us well fed and run a flexible kitchen that allow us absolute freedom to chase the sunlight and the northern lights.



DRESS FOR THE COLD

This is not an expedition to the North
Pole – you will not freeze to death
when visiting Arctic Scandinavia.
There's always a warm cabin and a hot
cup of chocolate just around the
corner, we make sure of it.

A full guide of warm gear to pack is supplied before the tour, but here's a sneak peak of what will get you through the journey:

A big puffy down jacket: You can quickly go from toasty temperatures inside the cottage to mega minus degrees outside. The hood is great in windy conditions, and fluffy edges help keep your face warmer too.

Windstopper gloves: Essential for operating your camera on sub-zero days.

Big boots: Leave room in the boots for extra air and you'll always have warm feet. Buy a bigger size and then stomp through knee deep snow without a worry.

Dry pants: We often romp through fresh snow to reach a shot, so a thin layer of dry pants simply keeps the snow and wind off your legs.

Thermals: A layer of thermals will keep a warm core close to your skin on the coldest of nights.

"There is no bad weather, only bad clothing."









LEARN AND EXPLORE

Anyone who loves photography can join this tour.

Skills and experience is not a prerequisite.
Enthusiasm is essential. There is ample one on one time so that your questions can be answered, your photos can be reviewed and your expression can be encouraged. With such a small group size we can ensure everybody gets the encouragement and guidance they desire.

If you're a confident photographer or already work at a professional level, then this journey will simply assist with getting great shots. We encourage everyone on tour to share ideas, to discuss their experiences and learn from each other as well.

Partners are also welcome on these photo tours, but they may need to exercise a little patience with the desires of photographers to make the most of special moments. These photography adventures put the photographers first:)



ART & CREATIVITY

The camera is like a paintbrush, and in the hands of different people it will produce very different images.

I specialise in teaching people about the creative potential of photography, to go beyond the technical issues of a camera and start taking creative control. Expression is at the heart of great photography, sharing your perspective, your view, your experience.

I'm also the author of the book "ReIMAGINE - changing your photography by changing your perspective"



WHATYOU **WILL LEARN**

For those who want to learn new techniques in landscape photography, or just advance their existing skills, here's a sample of what we hope to share with the group during our Norway journey.

- How to properly setup your tripod for stable shooting
- Controlling your subjects with your wide angle lens
- Why a wide angle lens is so powerful for compositions
- Getting closer to a subject to build stronger compositions
- Taking your time instead of "shoot and run"
- Depth of field as a tool for composition
- Still life to reveal texture in the landscape
- Processing RAW files to maximise creative potential
- Advanced techniques for refining your RAW processing
- Aurora photography with slow shutters and a wide angle
- Slow shutter technique for silky oceans and clouds
- High key compositions for snow filled landscapes
- Shooting into the sun while controlling shadow detail


INVITATION TO BEGINNERS

Everybody is on their own journey and we love helping people explore new horizons in photography. We take time to assist everyone on a tour with their specific needs, to talk about what they want to learn. Sometimes that means how to take advantage of different modes on the camera, sometimes it's a discussion about how to advance your career in photography.

No two people are the same. That's why we keep these trips limited to just 8 people, so we can enjoy their company and spend time helping everybody along with their particular journey.

You don't need to be an expert to come on this tour. We will help you with suggestions on what to bring to make the most of the opportunities.

We're here to help.



WHAT LENS TO PACK

You don't need a full-frame DSLR to enjoy this journey, but you do need a good lens. We've run dozens of trips like this one before and have a good understanding of which lens will give your camera the best results.

The most important lens for this trip will be an **ultra-wide angle** that is suitable for night photography. We need a seriously wide angle to capture the Northern Lights because the biggest and best events take up all of the night sky. The same ultra-wide perspective is also ideal for capturing the majestic nature of the landscape.

In full-frame terms, an 18mm lens is good, but 14mm is way better. We'll be happy to chat with you in advance of the tour about which lens is right for your camera and this adventure.



DRONES ON TOUR

If you are planning to bring a drone on a tour we do ask that you minimise the impostion on the rest of the group, both in terms of quiet enjoyment of a location and in terms of delaying the schedule.

As a general rule, when we stop at a location for photography we take plenty of time for that stop, and avoid rushing onwards. This means time to setup and pack down is often very feasible, but also means you may have to trade off time with your tripod vs time with the drone.

We do ask that you familiarise yourself with local regulations and in particular be aware of no fly zones. Sometimes air space in The Arctic is temporarily restricted due to military activity, and some locations we visit may be inside a national park where stricter rules apply.

Often, however, we're staying in a cabin with simply stunning views in every direction and it's easy to pop up the drone in the morning to capture a scene you will treasure for the rest of your life!









YOUR CAMERA GEAR

In addition to the ultra-wide angle lens you will also need a very good **tripod**. These often seem expensive to beginners and hard to justify the expense. Try to think of this as an essential part of aurora photography, and an investment in your photographic future.

A good tripod will be your friend for a very long time, while a cheap tripod will lead to disappointment and blurry photos that undermine your ability to get value from this tour.

The final bit of kit worth considering are a few Netural Density (ND) filters. Again we are happy to chat with you before the tour and make sure you have suitable gear. A really strong **ND** filter can be used to create super slow exposures of the ocean or clouds. We recommend to travel with an ND6 and ND10 so we can shoot slow shutter with beaches or rivers, in varying light conditions.




POST CAPTURE

Both Ian and Ewen like to emphasis the art of photography that takes place in the digital darkroom.

Every day of this adventure will allow for opportunities to discuss, refine and learn about post-processing techniques.

Please bring your laptop and your preferred processing software. A photo is never finished at the moment of the shutter, and as you learn different ways to process your images you can also adjust your technical approach to the camera accordingly.









MOODY WEATHER

We get a LOT of sunshine on these trips, but we also get snow and grey. It's the Arctic in winter after all and the occasional blizzard just means fresh powder snow the next morning. Some days may be bleak enough to stay inside to run sessions on processing RAW files instead.

Some days though the moody skies are just what we want to photograph. Ian Rolfe is a master of evoking character from those transitions, and he'll share his skill and knowledge of photographic and processing techniques to achieve this.

Ewen shoots a more reactive style compared to Ian, and offers a blend of editorial and fine art influences to our travellers. Slow shutters and passive compositions for example. Ewen loves the bright and sunny mood, but has a darker side too!



CAMERAS ARE COOL

We hear a lot of fuss about taking cameras into the Arctic conditions and how to prepare for the freezing temperatures. If you're shooting with a modern DSLR or mirrorless camera then you need no special equipment, modifications or protection. Snow brushes off when everything is cold, but take care to avoid it melting on a warm camera body.

On a recent journey in a colder region of the Arctic we spent hours with our gear shooting the Northern Lights in -32 temperatures. No problems. Your camera will go colder than that and still keep shooting. Your batteries wont last quite as long as when warm, but it's no drama. Really.

Heading outside at night to shoot the aurora does require that you take care of yourself, and ensure you keep your feet and fingers warm. We will provide a very detailed packing list to jelp you prepare for Arctic conditions, including advice on where to shop in Oslo for the best winter gear.
